This past October, the ECCSW held its first annual First Amendment, First Vote Summit in Seneca Falls, NY. This summit sought to educate high school girls throughout Western and Central New York about women's suffrage

and give them political efficacy to eventually run for elected office. On the first day, students Skyped with the director of the documentary UNLADYLIKE 2020,

Charlotte Mangin, and learned about the importance of media narratives. In the afternoon, Diana Cihak from Women Elect spoke to the girls about the nuts and bolts of running a campaign. Later, students participated in round table discussions with elected officials.

The second day started off at Wesleyan Chapel where the First Women's Rights Convention took place. Students were treated to Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Alice Paul reenactments that led them through the history of women's suffrage. They also met Coline Jenkins, great, great granddaughter of Elizabeth Cady Stanton. The girls heard inspiring remarks from Maria Whyte, Deputy Erie County Executive, about the importance of partici-



pating in democracy and her experience running for elected office. The students discussed a breadth of topics with legislatures ranging from financing campaigns, working with legislatures across the aisle, and the relationship between a candidate and the media. To cap off the summit, students convened with their respective high school groups to create an action agenda and plan ways to implement their ideas surrounding civic engagement in their communities.

2019 Teen Dating Violence Awareness Summit

This February, during Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month, the ECCSW held our 2nd Annual Healthy Relationships/Teen Relationship Violence Awareness Summit. This Summit is part of a larger state-wide initiative to empower and educate teens about healthy relationships. We collaborated with twelve different schools, as well as the Family Justice Center of Erie County, to bring male and female students together for educational workshops. These workshops aimed to help them develop the knowledge and skills needed to advocate for healthy relationships in their community. The Summit encouraged students to serve as ambassadors in their schools by initiating opportunities in leadership, peer mentorship, and advocacy related to teen relationship violence. The workshops explored topics such as what relationship violence looks like, identifying red flags and signs of abuse, actions to take, and media influence on relationships.


