American Rescue Plan Funding Allocated to Erie County



March 6, 2025

American Rescue Plan Act of 2021

Erie County received \$178.4 M of President Biden's ARPA State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF)

- Funds could be used to replace lost revenue and/or respond to public health/economic impacts of the pandemic, but also for water, sewer, and broadband projects.
- All funds must be obligated by December 31, 2024*
- All funds must be spent by December 31, 2026.

^{*} As of December 31, 2024, 100% of these SLFRF funds have been obligated.

ARPA UPDATE – ECSD Pumping Stations

Pumping Station Upgrades - \$9.4M

- Over 5,200 linear feet of the existing 30-inch diameter Depew Pumping Station force main replaced







ErieNET LDC established, mission is to:

- Create a foundation to address the broadband needs of unserved areas in Erie County
- Improve services in underserved areas of the community
- Enable world-class broadband investment and deployment countywide.



Intent is to create a self-sustaining network where enterprise, carrier, and other customers that desire to manage and control their own broadband networks pay a fee for access to the ErieNet fiber-optic network.

Unlimited bandwidth provided by the dark fiber will be available directly to "anchor institutions," including schools, colleges/universities, hospitals/health care, public safety facilities, government offices, industry, and libraries.

Focus is now on partnerships with 'final mile' service providers and enterprise entities, encouraging the use of the ErieNet backbone to expand competitive services, promote cybersecurity and create efficiencies throughout the county.


ARPA UPDATE – ErieNET Broadband Network

County committed \$34M of ARPA SLFRF funds for the construction of a 400+ mile Open Access 'Middle Mile' broadband network throughout Erie County

 Construction has begun and 'Make Ready' work on utility poles is underway. Awaiting additional pole clearances from National Grid and NYSEG.

ARPA UPDATE – ErieNET Broadband Network

Status as of December 31, 2024:

- **\$11M** has been spent to date for organizational operating systems, design, construction, fiber optic cable, sales/marketing, engineering, and legal/accounting services
- 'Make-Ready' work underway on approx. 13,000 existing utility poles.
- Point of Presence (PoP) in Rath Bldg completed.

Schedule for 2025-2026:

- ErieNet continues to build partnerships with ISP's for the NYS ConnectAll Affordable Housing Grant. These ISP partners will create choice and reduce cost for residential services.
- Expand sales/marketing, secure customers.
- Connect to the Convention Center, schools, universities, emergency services, and other priority 'anchor institutions'
- Expand construction as pole clearances are obtained.

Convention Center Façade: \$4.5M

 Removal of existing marquee and maintenance repairs to the existing façade including whole-building powerwashing, concrete panel repairs as well as installation of a new facade along Franklin St. with a new cladding system to cover the existing concrete panels.

Harlem Highway Barn New Build: \$5M

 New facility will improve the efficiency of operations year-round, especially in the winter plowing season. The Lancaster location is central to the district and will allow quicker access to roads, while providing modern facilities.

ARPA Update – DPW Infrastructure Projects

Rath Microgrid: \$8M

 Reliable, cost-effective alternative for backup power generation at the Rath Building. The system will replace the existing backup generator and includes an 85kW solar array. The Microgrid system is designed to provide uninterrupted power in the event of power loss from the grid and allow the County to participate in demand response that will aid the grid during extreme weather while providing remuneration for these services.

ARPA FUNDS – Economic and Workforce Investments

Small Business Promotion: \$1.9M

 Small business promotion programs including a shop local advertising campaign and a shop local gift card program (#Shop716), where individuals received a bonus \$20 when then bought a \$20 gift card to be used at local small businesses



 Training program to prepare low-income individuals for healthcare jobs with advancement opportunities. Nearly 700 residents were enrolled and progressing through healthcare careers training in the following programs: LPN, CNA, RN, Phlebotomist, Medical Assistant, Medical Technician.

Erie County Hazard Pay: \$3M

 Hazard pay for essential and front-line workers who kept services running while much of the country was in lockdown.





ARPA FUNDS – Investments in Health

COVID19 Mitigation: \$4.1M

 Funding dedicated to vaccination efforts including booster shots. Expenses included the rent of a warehouse that has been configured for vaccine and support material storage with ultra-cold freezers.



Office of Health Equity: \$974K

 Established an Office of Health Equity with a dedicated and professional public health staff that focuses specifically on health equity issues and the social determinants of health. The Office prepares annual reports to guide public health spending and efforts in the community



Erie County ARPA Overview



- 100% of ARPA SLFRF Funds allocated to Erie County were obligated prior to December 31, 2024 deadline.
- Generational investment in Erie County infrastructure, broadband access, and affordable housing creates jobs and economic development opportunities.
- ARPA SLFRF funding leveraged millions more in direct/indirect investments and accelerated the completion of high priority projects.
- ARPA funds will benefit every municipality in Erie County
