On going challenges to improve access at Primary Care remain. Some of which includes:

- Reimbursement for primary care doctors
- Lack of funding to develop an "outreach/resource team" that would provide inreach education to primary care and serve as a resource for those seeking consultation.
- System challenges exist at a higher level.

Working on a developing a panel of primary care providers doing MAT and behavioral health care providers to address challenges, barriers, and opportunities associated with collaboration.






OPIOID RELATED DEATHS ERIE COUNTY





2017 - 2021* Percent of Erie County Opioid Related Deaths








2016 – 2021* Percent of Erie County Opioid Related Deaths Associated with Fentanyl¹ and Cocaine

Primary Care Champions Project Findings

- Private provider offices cannot afford to provide MAT services
 - Capitated reimbursement big disincentive
 - FQHCs reimbursed at higher rates in general
- Hope to meet with health plan representatives to find solution

Narcan Trainings and deployment this quarter (7.1.2021 – 9.30.2021)

- Continued naloxone trainings and medication deployment conducted by the department, many are virtual or on the spot:
 - Law enforcement 33
 - Fire fighters 100
 - EMS/Healthcare Providers 433
 - Community outreach Opioid grant staff reach 572
 - Community members 689
 - Total kits distributed this quarter including mailing, virtual trainings and refills – 5197 kits



 - Surveys still being collected and entered for 2021


Respondent Ages

 - Something else?





Race/Ethnicity of Respondents




- More racial/ethnic diversity in successive years:


Age at "First Use to Get High"




Using Pain Pills Before Taking Opioids

- 2021 surveys are still being collected and entered.


Drug and Needle Sharing






- Question for "Have you ever shared your drugs?" was not collected in 2012.

Needle Kiosks: Awareness and Usage






- These questions were not asked in the 2012 survey.
- The survey audience is generally <u>aware</u> that our disposal kiosks exist, but getting them to <u>use</u> the kiosks may be an ongoing challenge.



Ever Received Drug Education in School






Ever Receive Drug Education in School, by Respondent Age




- Youngest participant to say "Yes" was 17; oldest is 72.

Respondents' Experiences with Naloxone / Narcan








OMRB Update

ECOTF Meeting: November 8, 2021

Recommendations based on these cases and actions to implement the recommendation include:

- 1) Reduce Stigma around addiction.
 - a. Widely promote the distribution of free Narcan kits and train people on their use.
 - b. Recognize substance use disorder (SUD) as a life-long chronic disease
 - Acknowledge Medication Assisted Therapy (MAT) as an evidence-based treatment for substance use disorder
- 2) Recognize and address Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)
 - a. Improve policies and linkages for reporting and addressing adverse childhood experiences
 - Create a comprehensive school-based system to recognize and intervene on ACES by offering social service referrals, training for teachers and staff on motivational interviewing and behavioral intervention techniques, and designing and implementing a skill building curriculum for students
 - Reduce barriers (i.e., needing parental permission, lack of access) for children/teens to access services and supports
- 3) Improve Access to Treatment
 - a. Increase immediate access to and reduce stigma around Medication Assisted Therapy (MAT) by increasing flexibility with behavioral counseling timeframes, case load restrictions, and advocate for revision of medication restrictions at the federal level.
 - Expand access to mental health, substance use, and peer counseling services though workforce development and implementation of the ECHO model, and advocate for revision of reimbursement systems.
 - b. Provide MAT in jails


Stigma Reduction Strategies

- One of the most effective ways the OMRB will engage with the community is by setting forth meetings with community stakeholders to forge collaboration with agencies.
- Community engagement is an essential component to the OMRB. It is important to bring awareness to the issue and reduce stigma around substance use disorder and its treatment.

Intervention Strategies for ACES

Objective: AWARENESS IN SCHOOL

Data Source: ECDOH, BOARD OF EDUCATION, SCHOOL DISTRICT NURSES.

Timeline: Ongoing – Mostly abiding by and following School Schedules

Partners: ECDOH, Board of Education, Police Departments, School Nurses, Pediatrician Office representative,

<u>Performance Measures</u>: Inservice's prior to school year, holiday breaks, incorporate School Enrichment curriculum on teacher education days. Increase number of individuals trained as evidenced by signed forms, all training documentation and forms signed and updated for easy access on training websites etc. Focus on school nurses, and guidance counselors and Delegate those individuals as the trainers and teach SBIRT in the school setting.

Improve Access to Treatment in Jails

<u>What Types of prescriptions are we advocating for in the correctional setting?</u>

- Buprenorphine (Suboxone) It can treat pain as well as addiction to narcotic pain relievers.
- Methadone: It can treat moderate to severe pain. It can also treat narcotic drug addiction.
- Naltrexone (Vivitrol) It can help prevent relapses into alcohol or drug abuse.

Re Entry Plannina

- Assistance with setting up primary appointment with treatment agency preferably day of release.
- Housing issues addressed
- Transportation to and from treatment agency
- Linkage with Peer from OMRB
- Social Services to set up for food, identification, SSI if applicable

Evidence Based Fact: Newly released prisoners having forced period of abstinence are 40 more times likely to die of an overdose within 30 days of release.

Case Management:

- Connecting these Individuals and their families with the resources.
- Committing to collaborate with the targeted audience to retain these resources.
- Quickly identifying the individual, prescribing M AT and linkage to service
- ► This will significantly reduce re incarceration and overdose fatalities rates .

The New OMRB Roles expanded

- ▶ OMRB will continue hosting Review Boards monthly Partnering with ECDOH, ME Office, HIDA, Evergreen Health services, Family advocate, Social Services, and any other group identified (Jail management, other treatment agencies, VA, Tribal Council etc.
- OMRB will facilitate peer linkage upon discharge of inpatient settings. By increasing and mounting Collaboration with Treatment agencies, discharge planners of inpatient settings, and correctional health the team
- OMRB will assist with the creation/curation of the Education and Training Modules for the school systems supporting EVB practices provided regarding ACES
- The first MAT support group will be hosted by the OMRB Peer.
- ► The OMRB will continue out reach support with the families.


The unit saw 0 non-fatal Overdoses in last nine months. 3 people in the unit diece (None appear to be Opioid Overdoses).

In the last three months the department has distributed 22 Narcan kits, bringing the total for this year to 70.

Since we began using the TCU V we have screened 2,974 individuals for possible SUD.


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TCU V Drug type # Responses Jan - June 2021





